





The Treasurers Report

We have \$1725, as of yesterday's deposit of the revenue from the JTree sites. There is one outstanding check for about \$145 to come out of that soon. Thus right now, we've got about \$1580. Last year at this time, I think we had about \$800. Sabine transferred \$500 to me at the beginning of the year and the remainder later after outstanding checks cleared.

In addition, we're about to start collecting membership fees for next year. Last year, about 50 people renewed within the first 2-3 months, which would be \$750. Even a truly conservative number of 30 people would bring in \$450. This conservative number of 30 full price renewals would bring us to \$2030, but I suspect it will be more. Even after midyear, there was a steady trickle (1-3/month) of memberships at the \$7 rate.

Our main expenditure and raison d'etre is booking campsites. Last year, we spent about \$1300 total for the entire year. However, money from the earlier ones had started arriving before many of the later ones were even booked, so we don't really need the full \$1300 in the account right now. We ran at about a 20% loss on campsites

for the year until JTree, which made an enourmous profit (\$300).

There are some other expenditures, mailing paper newsletters to those who want them, slide projector bulbs (rather expensive at \$30 each), but these totaled maybe \$300, another \$200 for picnic for the Access Fund cleanup day picnic and the Xmas party. These last two were pretty optional expenses, and were pretty late in the year, by which time we knew campsites were only slightly in the hole, and we had plenty of money in the account.

In view of the excess, I think we could look at lightening the account by at least \$600, probably more like \$800, and still have more than enough to take care of next year's expenses.

2003 – Proposed Trips

The bit you have all been waiting for... Here is a list of proposed trips for 2003 that has been compiled on the basis of suggestions of members. Many of those members have said that they would be willing to lead the suggested trips, if they go ahead as planned. Many of the trips on this list are not yet definite. It will take interest, organization and enthusiasm on the part of the organizer and Rock Rendezvous members to ensure trips will indeed happen...

If you wish to help out with any of the proposed trips, or have opinions on the locations and suggested times that trips should run, then please do e-mail me (cdent@sangamo.com) or one of the organizers listed. If you wish to organize a trip to an additional location please contact me, with a proposed time (this does not need to be exact) and I can add it to the list. Suggested locations include...a Desert Towers trip, the Grotto, the Balls, Fresno Dome, Needles, CA, Goat Rock, Mt. Diablo, Cosumnes River, Devil's Tower, Castle Rock, Mickey's Beach, Mt. Tamalpais, Indian Rocks, Golden Gate Wall, Pinnacles National Monument, and Mt. St. Helena, Napa Valley... The possibilities seem to be endless!!!


