Just like booking yourself on a flight – please don't book until you're absolutely certain you can attend and be prepared to pay the penalties if you can't attend, i.e., pay your trip fee if no one else is able to take your place. If you give people enough notice that you are going to un-sign yourself on a trip, there is a higher likelihood of someone taking your place so you won't have to pay.

The money we collect from dues and campsite fees go toward booking future campsites, stocking up on food and drinks for the RR Xmas party and giving back to the climbing community, such as Adopt-a-Crag events. That's why we ask you to kindly take heed of the club policies. More about this on page 3. Thanks!

### THE CLUB SMALL PRINT YOU MUST READ!

A word on campsite booking... It's time for the annual reminder on the mindful use of the trip signup sheet.

#### Sign-up cancellation policy

When you sign up for a trip please note that if you cancel your place on the trip less than 3 days before the start of the trip, then you will need to pay the campsite fee for your portion (assuming we don't fill your space). OK that's the small print (it does in fact say that on the trip reservation page of the website). Please be considerate to other club members.

If people reserve places on a trips early on, on the off-chance that they may make it then you are depriving some other willing member of a place. Please

only put your name down on a trip if you really think you can make it. If you can't make it then take your name off as soon as you know and e-mail the club so that other members get a chance to get on - it's only fair!

#### **About the T-Meadows campground**

The Tuolumne Meadows campground isn't exactly high tech so we don't usually know the site number there in advance. If you check in there with a ranger on Friday, the rangers don't put the site on the list for late arrivers when they leave at the end of the day. So people who arrive after you Friday



evening or Saturday have no idea what site the club is on and there may be no one there to ask. So even if you aren't the trip leader, you need to post the site on the bulletin board. If you get there late Friday and see the site is posted at the kiosk, then the leader needs to post the site on the bulletin board for people arriving on Saturday. The rangers remove un-dated messages from the bulletin board in the morning, undoing your good deed, so put a date on the notice you put up.

## Please be considerate when sharing bear boxes

Space in the bear boxes is usually pretty tight. Please be considerate of the other people using the site that weekend. So don't bring a bunch of food you won't eat with you. If you have a bunch of food with you that you won't use that weekend, store it in a bear box at a trailhead or parking lot. Don't put non-food items like paper plates, big plastics boxes with a tiny bit of food, and stoves in the bear box.

The goal of the club is for everyone get a chance to go climbing and have fun. If the trip sign-ups are always full of people who don't bother to show up, or if no one can find the campsite because it's not posted, and once they get to the campsite find the bear box full, only the sado-maochists in the group are having fun.

The season has started, complete with a Nut Cracker busted ankle and a busy Camp 4.

#### **YOSEMITE FACE LIFT:**

Sept. 22 to 25: Ken Yager, myself, and a variety of others are pulling together the second annual "Yosemite Face Lift." In short, it's a huge four day volunteer clean up effort; no holds barred, verywhere and everything. Free camping for those who contact Ken (or myself) while supplies last. Huge bash on Sunday night with free gear to give away from Patagonia, Black Diamond, Access Fund, Metolius, and others. T-shirts, Cliff Bars, and all the psych you could want. The idea is to give the whole Valley a once-over: roads, pullouts, trails, approaches, descents, riverbanks, routes, parking lots, campsites, everywhere. Stay tuned for more details, and contact Ken or myself to line up a free campsite (and park entry pass) for the event: "yager at inreach dot com", or "lincoln\_else at nps dot gov."

#### **CAMP 4 COFFEE:**

It¹s back. After a fun Tuolumne "mid season" in the Meadows store parking lot, Camp 4 coffee will be back in it¹s original home starting this week. Sunday morning, 9:00, coffee, hot chocolate, tea, and all the beta you'll ever need. Bring your questions, concerns, ideas, and whatever else.



#### **CAMP 4 PARKING:**

The dirt lot next to Camp 4 is (and will continue to be) a construction staging area, so parking is tight. To alleviate some of the squeeze we've opened one of the bus lots across the street for registered Camp 4 guests to use overnight. Here's my post from last month with the details:

Starting now, registered Camp 4 guests can park in "Bus Lot B" overnight from 6:00 PM to 8:30 AM. Parking is tight everywhere in the Valley, and this lot is needed for bus parking during the day. At night, however, it can serve as an overflow parking area for Camp 4 visitors. This is good news for Camp 4 folks, but it comes with some caveats:

The lot is for legitimate Camp 4 registered guests only. This is NOT the place to scam a parking space; if you don't have a legit car tag you'll get cited and/or towed. Yes, the NPS will be checking tags, so whether you're in the Camp 4 lot or the new overflow space, display your tag clearly. Not to sound like a broken record, but don't screw this up for everyone else.

We need to be out of the lot by 8:30, no questions, no excuses. If you're not heading out on huge adventures early in the morning and need to park your car for the day use day use parking. If you want to leave your car for the duration of your stay (and you can't find a space in Camp 4), best bet is the Curry Orchard lot.

#### **EVENING PROGRAMS:**

Every Saturday night the American Alpine Club and the NPS sponsor a climbing program at the Lodge Amphitheater. Check the climbing info board in front of Camp 4 for upcoming speakers/shows. This week Royal Robbins will be giving his slide show, and Tom Frost will be coming next week. If you haven't seen their shows (or even if you have), don't miss them. Stay tuned for more events as the fall unfolds. Yes, I'll try to get the Hubers back for another family oriented show about "zee space beneez my pants."

#### MEMORIAL GATHERING FOR ERICA KUTCHER:

More details soon. A variety of Yosemite friends are organizing a memorial event for Erica in late September (likely on Saturday, Sept. 24). We'll post more information here when the details are solid, but spread the word to all those who would like to participate.

#### ACCIDENT REPORTS ON THE FRIENDS OF YOSAR PAGE:

Many climbers read "Accidents in North American Mountaineering" (which, coincidentally, should be out for last year quite soon), and its value as an educational tool is immeasurable. Unfortunately, it is published up to a year after some accidents, and dependable timely accident reports can be hard to track down immediately after an incident. I have often posted climbing accident details here on Supertopo, but these are sporadic at best.

In a new effort to get solid up-to-date information out to the interested public as soon as possible, myself and others on Yosemite's rescue team are publishing accident reports on the "Friends of YOSAR" web site. These reports are modeled on the ANAM style write-ups, but in the busy season they are often quite "quick and dirty." The goal is to get accident info out to as many people as possible as soon as possible. Take a look, and stay tuned for more reports as the system



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gets up and running (it¹s a work in progress). Huge thanks to Nate Knight for getting the web end of this off the ground:

#### **RIVER DEATHS:**

Two people died in water related accidents this week in Yosemite. The first was a hiker who drowned above Nevada Fall last Friday (no, the hiker did no go over the fall). The second was a hiker who fell off Upper Yosemite Fall on Monday afternoon. Check the FOYOSAR site for more detailed accident reports on these incidents soon, and always treat Yosemite's waterways with the utmost caution. Ironically, low water seems to cause more accidents than raging high water; it's not nearly as intimidating and we forget how dangerous it truly can be.

#### **CRAP BAGS TOSSED OFF EL CAP:**

More than a few climbers have complained to me recently about parties tossing trash off El Cap routes (including crap bags). Not to be too harsh, but this is absolutely pathetic. Spread the word: if you toss your waste off a wall in Yosemite you are hurting the entire climbing community. You will get cited for doing so, and if we as a community have any self respect, you will be shunned, mocked, disgraced, and publicly humiliated for being a disrespectful selfish moron. This issue is so last year ... let's move on.

#### ACCESS FUND GRANT FOR BEAR BOXES AT CLIMBING AREAS:

On a more positive note: thanks to a generous grant from the Access Fund Yosemite¹s most popular big wall trail heads will have bear box food storage lockers by the end of September. Stay tuned for details (and volunteer opportunities putting them in ... they're darn heavy). El Cap, Leaning Tower, and Washington Column (the Ahwahnee parking lot) should all be equipped with lockers soon.

#### **LEANING TOWER TRAIL WORK:**

Last of all, if anyone feels like building some karma next month (before the Yosemite Face Lift), Chris Van Leuven and myself are organizing a small trail eradication/clean-up effort in the Leaning Tower area. The idea is to get rid of the multiple eroded trails that head up toward the base and clearly mark one good route for all to use. Contact me ahead of time if you're interested (it shouldn¹t take too many people), or just show up for coffee on Sunday, September 11th ready for an afternoon of work.

That's all for the moment. Thanks for taking the time to read this, and I'll see you at Coffee (I'll be in TM till then, but I'll respond to posts [to the SuperTopo Climber's Forum] by Sunday night).



# Inspiring photographs from the Misha Logvinov collection





#### Description by Gus:

The climb was the first ascent of the east ridge of Denali, in 1969, written up as the Catacomb and East Ridges of MtMcKinley in the 1970 American Alpine Journal, (and hasn't been repeated, to my knowledge). 7 climbers, 5 weeks. A classic old non-alpine style ascent, with fixed ropes and multiple camps. Of some interest in that this was the route that Frederic Cook claimed to have made the first ascent of McKinley in 1905 in a few days. Approach was via the Ruth Glacier, with some great views of Mt. Huntington and the Rooster Comb.
